Jean-Paul Sartre est un des grands philosophes du XXe siècle, et nous fêtons cette année le centenaire de sa naissance. The Philosophical Contexts of The Wall and Other Stories presents a philosophical analysis of all five stories in Sartre's short-story collection,

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concentrating on characters' acts of bad faith. Kevin W. Sweeney argues that each of the five stories has its own philosophical problem that serves as the context for the narrative, and that Sartre constructs each story as a reply to the philosophical issue in the context and as support for his position on that issue. Le recueil de récits d'enfance tire son intérêt et son originalité de son caractère collectif en rupture avec la conception classique du récit d'enfance comme entreprise individuelle et autonome. L'impact de la forme brève imposée par le recueil sur le récit d'enfance pose avec acuité la question du renouvellement (ou non) des modalités d'écriture de l'enfance: sélection des souvenirs, reconduite ou subversion des motifs liés à l'enfance. Tirant profit des théories stipulant le dynamisme du recueil, cet ouvrage prône une lecture hypertextuelle de trois collectifs rassemblant des écrivains francophones d'horizons divers qui, à partir d'un fragment d'enfance, relatent leurs rapports complexes à la grande Histoire et à la petite histoire mais aussi au pays d'origine et au pays de l'exil, à la langue maternelle et à la langue d'écriture. Au-delà de la problématique postcoloniale, la poétique des textes transversale pratiquée cherche à tracer des liens transculturels entre des enfances issues de mondes très différents. This volume presents selected papers from the conference 'Violence, Culture and Identity' held at St Andrews University in 2003. It seeks to explore the ways in

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which French writing since 1920 has registered and reflected on the violent national traumas of the World Wars, the Occupation and decolonisation. The essays consider how these crises have led French writers to a critical, often painful reassessment of national, cultural and individual identity. Contributors trace the different challenges offered to any comfortable consensual notions of Frenchness, and to the structures of authority which invest in such a consensus. A recurrent preoccupation is the problematic issue of 'memory culture', especially of how a post-conflict generation copes with an avowed or concealed inheritance of violence and guilt. The thematics, ethics, rhetoric and imagery of violence are charted through debates around surrealism and in writings by major figures, such as Malraux, Sartre, Camus, Genet and Modiano, while a final group of essays looks closely at how a new wave within the popular roman noir genre (the 'néo-polar') engages emphatically and controversially with these issues and their political implications.

The starting point for this compilation is the wish to rethink the concept of antisemitism, race and gender in light of Sartre's pioneering *Réflexions sur la Question Juive* seventy years after its publication. The book gathers texts by prestigious scholars from different disciplines in the Humanities and the Social Sciences, with the objective of revisiting this work locating it within the setting of

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two other pioneering – and we argue, related – publications, namely Simone De Beauvoir's *Le deuxième sexe* of 1949 and Franz Fanon's *Peau noire et masques blancs* of 1952. This particular and original standpoint sheds new light on the different meanings and political functions of the concept of antisemitism in a political and historical context marked by the post-modern concepts of multi-ethnicity and multiculturalism.

The rootless Jew, wandering disconnected from history, homeland, and nature, was often the target of early twentieth-century nationalist rhetoric aimed against modern culture. But following World War II, a number of prominent French

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philosophers recast this maligned figure in positive terms, and in so doing transformed postwar conceptions of politics and identity. Sarah Hammerschlag explores this figure of the Jew from its prewar usage to its resuscitation by Jean-Paul Sartre, Emmanuel Levinas, Maurice Blanchot, and Jacques Derrida. Sartre and Levinas idealized the Jew's rootlessness in order to rethink the foundations of political identity. Blanchot and Derrida, in turn, used the figure of the Jew to call into question the very nature of group identification. By chronicling this evolution in thinking, Hammerschlag ultimately reveals how the figural Jew can function as a critical mechanism that exposes the political dangers of mythic allegiance, whether couched in universalizing or particularizing terms. Both an intellectual history and a philosophical argument, *The Figural Jew* will set the agenda for all further consideration of Jewish identity, modern Jewish thought, and continental philosophy.

Injustice hâtive, retour de galet, qui est en passe de faire de l'auteur de *La Nausée*, sinon un philosophe sans invention, du moins un écrivain sans saveur - sans autre goût que politique. C'est donc contre cette méconnaissance littéraire que les études ici rassemblées voudraient prendre position. Elles tentent de relire les oeuvres sartriennes - avant tout *La Nausée*, " *L'Enfance d'un chef* ", les biographies existentielles, mais aussi *Les Séquestrés d'Altona* et *Les Mots* - en mettant l'accent sur les effets ironiques de leurs structures, sur la connivence qu'elles réclament du lecteur, par un jeu savant mené avec la tradition littéraire, sur la perversion existentialiste qu'elles accomplissent du mysticisme. Car Sartre, s'il a un jour conçu la littérature comme engagement, la définissait encore comme " herméneutique du silence " - cela méritait aussi un coup de plume. With individual chapters written by specialists, *Short French Fiction* offers the reader new insights into some of the best examples of this genre and an impression of where this type of writing is heading as the new millennium approaches.

Sartre's *Second Century* reflects the richness of Sartre's vision of the human condition, the diversity of the means he employed in grappling with it, and the lengthy trajectory of his itinerary, in a variety of wider cultural perspectives. The centenary of Sartre's birth in 2005 was the primary occasion for many of the essays included in this volume. Hosted by the UK or North American Sartre Societies, contributors participating in Sartre's centennial celebrations were asked to address the central themes and overall development of his life and thought. As the present collection shows, the attempt to present Sartre in a retrospective light also provides a basis for assessing the relevance of his work for the new century.

L'enfance d'un chef Editions Gallimard

Published on the occasion of Sartre's Centenary, this book helps to understand the man behind the work, offering a psycho-social analysis of Jean-Paul Sartre with an emphasis on his masculinity. It sets out to contextualize Sartre in terms of his psycho-sexual formation and processes of self-constitution in view of his childhood. The main period under detailed study is 1905-1945, before Sartre became the Sartre. It concentrates on his early childhood, his teenage years in La Rochelle, the years at the Ecole Normale, and the first few years of his adulthood, with specific attention on the war years. An analysis of Sartre's relationships follows, with Simone de Beauvoir and other women and men (including love and sex), before a

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postscript covering the period 1973-1980. This essay is not a reductive account. It tells the story of Jean-Paul Sartre, from the inside out, so that the achievements of one of the major intellectuals of the 20th Century can be measured against his own internal struggles.

This work highlights key areas of common ground between the ethical, aesthetic and political content of works from Sartre's early period and classic Marxist philosophy. Taking account of both the specificity of early Sartrean thought and the heterogeneity of Marxist theories, it affirms their lasting importance to the radical left critique.

"This volume represents the first in-depth English-language study of the French combat novel of the Great War, an immensely popular genre at the time which includes influential texts such as Henri Barbusse's *Le Feu* and Roland Dorgeles's *Les Croix de bois*.
